Introduction

We have been learning that the /er/ sound is an r-controlled vowel sound. ER can come in the middle of a word, such as the words verb and fern. ER can also come at the end of a word, such as the word her.

Continued from previous column...

However, when we see ER at the end of a two-syllable word, it is usually pronounced using the schwa sound, /ə/, such as the words letter and number.

Articulatory Gesture

To make the schwa /ə/ sound, open your mouth just a little bit, like this...(model). Be sure your voice is on. Unlike all the other vowel sounds, we don't really stretch out the schwa. We say it more quickly. Watch me /ə/. You try /ə/. Sometimes, a schwa can sound a little like a short u /ŭ/ or a short i /ĭ/, but it's actually more relaxed than either of those. Watch me again /ə/. You try again /ə/.
